If You Smell Rotten Eggs... Take Action Immediately

Natural gas is odorized with a “rotten egg” smell to help you detect leaks quickly. If you smell gas:

-  **Evacuate immediately** - leave the building.
-  **Do NOT use electronics or switches** - sparks can ignite gas.
-  **Call 911 and your utility from a safe location.**

Appliance Installation & Maintenance

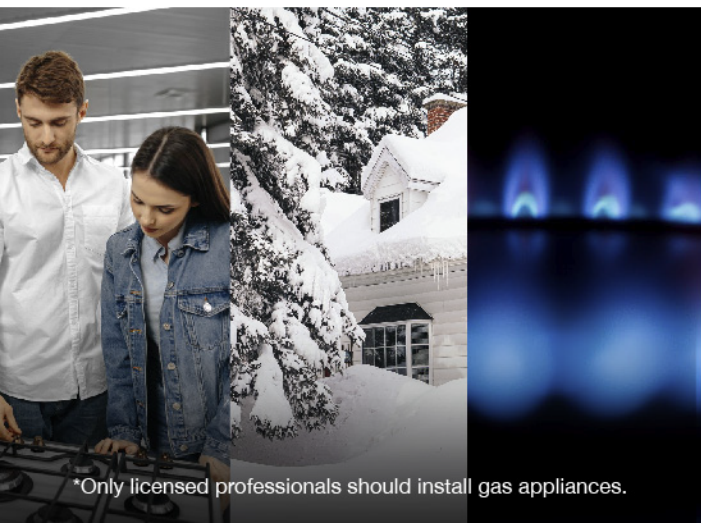
Make sure all gas appliances are installed by a qualified professional and serviced regularly. Improper connections can create hazards.

Ventilation

Keep appliance vents and chimneys clear of debris, snow, and ice. Blockages can allow dangerous gases to build up indoors.

Pay Attention to Warning Signs

Flames should burn blue, not yellow or orange. Soot or unusual smells near appliances may indicate a problem.



*Only licensed professionals should install gas appliances.
